### LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

Shake Up The Establishment (SUTE) is a national youth-led registered not-for-profit organization (#1190975-4) that focuses on promoting climate justice within the geographical confines of what is currently known as "Canada". We use an intersectional approach to promote non-partisan political advocacy, craft accessible evidence-informed educational resources to improve climate and environmental literacy and work to collaborate directly with underserved and structurally vulnerable communities to address injustices.

Our address resides upon Treaty 3 land, on the territories of the Erie, Neutral, Huron-Wendat, Haudenosaunee and Mississaugas Peoples. We are humbled to be able to follow the lead of Indigenous-led efforts toward the stewardship protection and of this environment since time immemorial. We honour the contributions of Indigenous, Black and other racialized peoples within the climate justice space and recognize their resiliency in the face of systemic oppression as imposed by the Canadian state. We aim to incorporate joy, rest and dreaming of futures throughout our work, particularly for BIPOC women and gender-diverse, neurodiverse and (dis)abled youth, to help craft a more sustainable movement.

We are aware that our actions as an organization and the work we put out have an impact on our land, and on all that inhabit it. Our enterprise is inclusive of all peoples who call the geographical confines of what is currently known as Canada, home, and we celebrate the horizontal learning that comes identities. diverse from our As an organization, we will try our utmost best to ensure that only individuals with lived experiences are speaking for their communities, while still recognizing that racialized and Indigenous communities, communities, and others of 2SLGBTQ+ minoritized and historically excluded identities are not a monolith.

We firmly believe in accountability, and commit to being as transparent as possible in our activism space; to research our topics well, support and centre community care, and minimize any harm, no matter the intent.

We actively prioritize the implementation of anti-oppressive practices, safe space policies and accountability procedures above all deliverables and work as we value these to be more important for the wellbeing of our SUTE family and the community that supports our work. We continue to learn about historical and present injustices to ensure we promote the use of a trauma-informed, equity-centred approach in our work through addressing our platform, educational Righting History's Active Learning Club initiative which is mandatory for all members to participate in, and we audit/ update our policies and practices, on a minimum yearly, but always as-needed, basis.

### **Mission Statement**

Shake Up The Establishment is a non-partisan organization that aims to make credible, evidence-informed information readily available to the Canadian population to promote informed voting, advocacy practices, and political accountability surrounding human and social justice issues that are exacerbated by the climate crisis.

### **Climate Justice Approach**

Climate justice is a human-centred approach toward addressing social, ecological and economic issues exacerbated by the climate crisis. Climate Justice activism, in our definition, means to utilize equity-focused advocacy practices to ensure a liveable and sustainable future for all, given that the impacts of the climate crisis and environmental degradation have not, and will not, be borne equally across all populations.





#### **Movers & Shakers**

SUTE's second annual Movers & Shakers program aimed to provide youth with the tools to take action on local climate issues by developing the necessary skills, networks, and solutions to engage meaningfully in climate justice. Five events were hosted over three months. including political literacy training, climate action mobilization workshops, case competitions, and hot topic crash courses on topics such as pipelines and mobilizing youth for the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

### Voices of the Greenbelt: Educational Programming

A docuseries focussed on providing an outdoor guided experience describing the history, significance, risks, key characteristics of selected GB natural spaces to encourage public use and appreciation of both popular and lesserknown Greenbelt features. Objectives are to:

- Increase awareness and public education, specifically among youth, of the importance, activities and natural solutions of the Greenbelt
- Amplify Indigenous voices and supporting their environmental stewardship of the land
- Increase visits to environmentally and culturally significant sites in the Greenbelt

### **Righting History**

<u>Righting History</u> is a new collaborative platform dedicated to addressing environmental racism and achieving climate justice through education and awareness of the "true" history of what is currently known as "Canada". This initiative will meaningfully contribute towards the ongoing societal learning (and unlearning) of histories of minoritized, oppressed, and unduly underrepresented groups with the intention of decentralizing the white hegemonic narrative and thus creating new narratives that enable BIPOC to be better supported within environmental activism and climate justice work. We are not re-writing history.

### Carbon Knowledge Series: Canadian Institute of Climate Choices

Ongoing work with CICC to cultivate the next generation of climate leaders through conducting primary research on the topic of carbon offsets and pricing, beginning with creating and administering a survey for phase one of three. The survey's purpose was to collect primary research on the topic of carbon offsets and pricing and to gauge the current public awareness of carbon offsets and how they influence consumer behaviour and decision-making.

#### **Not Voting F\*cking Sucks**

In response to the 2021 federal election, SUTE launched our <u>Not Voting F\*cking</u> <u>sucks campaign</u>, an urgent call to youth voters from youth with 3 primary goals: to increase youth voter turnout; to increase the public's knowledge about climate change and the Canadian political system so individuals can make an informed decision for whom to support; and, to centre climate justice as the forefront issue for this election.

- Created a non-partisan, understandable, fully-referenced political comparison chart for voters to explore the environmental platforms of each major party sideby-side. Data was collected daily from party platforms and media engagements and chart updates were made live on a weekly basis leading up to voting day.
- Created a starter pack consisting of federal election print resources to explore before voting, including foundational and historical concepts of federal elections and politics in what is currently Canada and mapped the progress of environmental policies, SDGs, and Paris Agreement targets.
- Hosted a tabling Event at Patagonia Toronto where members of the public could pick up brochures, print resources, stickers, and ask our SUTE members questions about the organization and the upcoming election.

#### **VOLUNTEER INITIATIVES**

#### **Active Learning Club**

The ALC (or Active Learning Club) is SUTE's initiative to ensure that all members of our community are constantly engaged in current events, as well as active learners of historic systems of oppression so that we are all able to actively dismantle such systems in the pursuit of justice. Integrated alongside topics of social justice, we will also feature a range of issues related to climate change, environmental degradation, and Canadian politics.

Each month, a new theme is chosen that is topical to current events, and we provide a curated list of educational resources (things to watch, read, or listen to) on it. The idea is not to certify anyone as an "ally", but rather to help in concert the educational efforts surrounding justice, and help give fellow community members structured, long-term activities to engage in anti-discrimination/equity work/learning. The current themes may recur and are dependent on suggestions, as well as what is going on in our world that requires coverage. We also email participants if we come across any workshops, training, or other educational activities, as well as any major petitions/calls to action.



#### **Makers & Shakers**

With the fashion industry responsible for around 10% of global emissions, supporting slow fashion and local creators has never been more important. SUTE partnered with local artist Saffron Locas-Hoeltken who created handembroidered, upcycled, limited edition SUTE sweaters for <u>sale on our site</u>.
